Imagine sitting in a room with over 1,600 teenagers that share the same passion for service as you do. This is what it is like to be at International Convention. This year ICON was in beautiful Anaheim, California. From the live entertainment to the five hour caucusing, every minute of ICON was a blast! ICON began with the Meet and Greet, giving everyone the opportunity to meet other Key Clubbers from around the world. The next day was busy as Opening Session took place. From there we attended caucuses to hear speeches from all of the candidates running for International office.

Key Club delegates attended the House of Delegates where several amendments were discussed. One of the amendments with much controversy was the amendment to change the dues. After much discussion, the House voted to raise the dues by fifty cents instead of the proposed two dollars. Dues are now \$7.00 instead of \$6.50 as in the past. To end the night, Key Clubbers danced the night away at the beach themed dance.

The next day was just as busy as members attended the growth session, workshops, and the inspirational luncheon, along with visiting the service fair. The rest of the evening included the recognition ceremony, where awards were given. The awards won by the NEBD are featured on the opposite page. To celebrate these accomplishments and the 4th of July, members went to Disney to watch the fireworks.

Our third day was packed full of great workshops and information about the Eliminate Project as members attended the Eliminate Project luncheon. Did you know that there are only 26 more countries which need to eliminate MNT! We started with 59 countries needing to eliminate MNT, and we have eliminated it from 33 countries! How exciting is that? The rest of the evening included the second House of Delegates where delegates voted on who they wanted for their International Board, closing ceremonies, and a dance for the Eliminate Project.

ICON is such an amazing experience, and I recommend it to all Key Club members. ICON next year will take place in Indianapolis and will include Kiwanis, Circle K, and Key Club to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of Kiwanis and the completion of the Eliminate Project!

The Eliminate Project

Camp Sunshine



More than 100 million mothers and babies are at risk, and every nine minutes a child dies of Maternal and Neonatal Tetanus (or MNT for short). In twenty-four countries in the world the joy of childbirth can be turned into tragedy. So why hasn't the world been rid of this tragic disease? The effects are excruciating — tiny newborns suffer repeated, painful convulsions and extreme sensitivity to light and touch. There is little hope of survival. Tetanus kills mothers too. Those affected are often living in the most isolated regions on earth. They're the poorest of poor and without health care.

But fear not, because MNT is preventable! Just \$1.80 each can save these mothers and ALL of their future babies. Together UNICEF and Kiwanis (and that includes all K-Family members) have partnered up to raise funds to wipe this disease out of existence. With efforts made already we only have twenty-four countries remaining with MNT (the most recent to be eliminated being Madagascar), but we can't stop here. This is year 5 (celebrate) of the Eliminate Project campaign, and our final year of this particular campaign. It will take US \$110 million dollars to eliminate MNT, and as of August 16, 2014, we have raised a total of \$61,431,570.07.

Your Key Club can make a difference and save mothers and their babies too. Whether you hold a car wash to raise money or even hold a fundraiser night at a restaurant, you're making a difference. Now is the time to get together and make this world a better place, and help the Kiwanis Family and UNICEF eliminate this terrible disease.

Camp Sunshine is a camp located in on Sebago Lake in Casco, Maine that offers a year-round program free of charge to children with life threatening illnesses and their immediate families. This year-round program is free of charge to all families, and it includes 24-hour onsite medical and psychosocial support. Bereavement groups are also offered for families who have lost a child to an illness.

Camp Sunshine was founded in 1984 by Dr. Larry Gould and Anna Gould, the owners of Point Sebago. For seventeen years, they donated the facilities and the personnel of their resort for the camp's operation of four weeks each year. After watching a TV program on a camp for children with cancer, Dr. and Mrs. Gould decided to offer a similar program at their resort. Discussions with the chief of pediatric oncology at Children's Hospital in Boston resulted in the Goulds offering a pilot family camp, where forty-three sick children and their families were guests for a week in June 1984. They continued to offer the program at no charge to the families, expanding to four weeks a year, two weeks in early June and two weeks in late September. As demand for services far exceeded capacity, a permanent facility, built on twenty-three acres donated by the Goulds, was opened in June 2001. The campus has the capacity to hold 1,200 families a year! Camp Sunshine can accommodate forty families each session at no expense to them. They house 65-75 volunteer staff and feed 275 people every day!

The mission of Camp Sunshine is to provide respite, support, joy and hope to children with life-threatening illnesses and their immediate families through various stages of a child's illness. Camp Sunshine has received numerous awards throughout the years including the following:

 - February 2004- Camp Sunshine receives ACA Honor The Eleanor P. Eells Award for Program Excellence
 - June 2004- Camp Sunshine honors Founder Larry Gould with the Camp's First Annual Lifetime Achievement Award
 - October 2006- Guinness World Records Confirms Camp Sunshine's World Record for the Most Lit Jack-O-Lanterns in One Place at One Time
 - September 2007- Camp Sunshine Sand Castle is World's Tallest according to Guinness
 - September 2011- Camp Sunshine Receives Highest Rank among Maine Charities for Financial Oversight and Transparency from Nation's Largest Charity Evaluator

Pastapalooza

Pastapalooza is an annual event at Mystic Valley which has been running eleven years, and every year it keeps getting better and better. For this event, the Mystic Valley Key Club joins forces with the student government from every grade and the art club. The student government is responsible for raffling off different gift baskets and organizing the talent show, and the art club displays artwork from many of the school's talented artists. This fun-filled event went very well this year and was the most successful run of Pastapalooza yet. There were 330 reservations made this year, building off of the previous year's 250. The event raised a total of approximately \$1200, which will be donated to Key Club's District Projects. All of those who attended the event and helped raise this money were also informed of where their donations would be going. At the door, everyone was given a flyer describing Key Club's District Projects. Pastapalooza is a great way to spread the word about Key Club and all of the great work it does! The guests were able to enjoy their dinners served by Key Clubbers, which was followed by the talent show, arranged by the student government. Many Key Clubbers also performed in the talent show, and Mystic Valley Key Club's vice president Becky Fisk, who took second place at the DECON talent show, again performed and pleased the audience with "Yeah Toast." At the end of a great night, hundreds of guests went home happy, and hundreds of community service hours had been completed by the Key Club.

Pastapalooza is a phenomenal event for the whole school community that brings together many of Mystic Valley's student organizations for a great night of pasta and performances, an event that the school's Key Club is proud to have a part in.

MS Awareness

The Key Clubbers of Division 6 have been fortunate enough to have the opportunity to work with the Maine Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society (NMSS). For those of you who may not know what Multiple Sclerosis is, it is a chronic, progressive disease involving damage to nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord. Symptoms may include numbness, impairment of speech and of muscular coordination, blurred vision, and severe fatigue. These symptoms make it very hard to complete simple tasks, such as washing windows, weeding a garden, organizing a bedroom, etc.

Over the month of May, a group of volunteers had the opportunity to work in multiple service projects organized by coordinators from the NMSS. Two of these projects were "MS Service Days." They entailed around five or six volunteers that were assigned to a local MS patient's house to help them with simple service around the yard and house. The volunteers raked the patient's yard, planted flowers, organized closets inside the house, and washed the windows. The patient was extremely grateful for our help, for without it these jobs would not have been completed.

On Friday, May 23, President of Portland Key Club Annika Erikson, President of Cheverus Key Club Hayley Roche, Vice President of Scarborough Key Club Ally Averill, and myself spent two hours planting orange flags for MS Awareness. This year, MS Awareness Day fell on May 28. Typically the flags are up for about a week before MS Awareness Day so everyone in the community can see them. This was the third year that the project has been completed, and it is also completed in all of the other states in New England. Each flag represents one person in Maine living with MS. As a result of the project, 3000 flags were planted in front of the New England Rehabilitation Hospital of Portland.
